Habitat Needs

The God-sized effort of building a habitat house that our congregation took on a few years ago is complete. Thank you all.

Our efforts now are much more modest but still needed and appreciated.

We are on the habitat schedule for feeding the work crew on the second Saturday of each month. I have heard first hand from one of the foremen that when they acquire lunch for themselves the bill is submitted to habitat, depleting the available building funds.

This is how it works.

Expect a crew of 12.

Morning Snack served around 10:00

juice, coffee, muffins, rolls, finger breakfast foods, granola bars, fresh fruit

Lunch served around 12:00

sandwiches cut in halves, sides of potato or pasta salad, coleslaw, chips

hearty soups, chili or stews with rolls work during cold months

cookies, brownies, etc.

We're also asked to bring waterless hand cleaner plus anything required for eating such as cups, napkins, forks, etc. *(When I did it they had a supply of these things from previous meals so I was able to take home the items I had brought, but better safe than sorry)*

I stayed to eat lunch, visit with the crew and tour the house before cleaning up.

Volunteers are needed. Although I did it by myself having someone to pair with could be fun and make an increased crew easier to handle.
