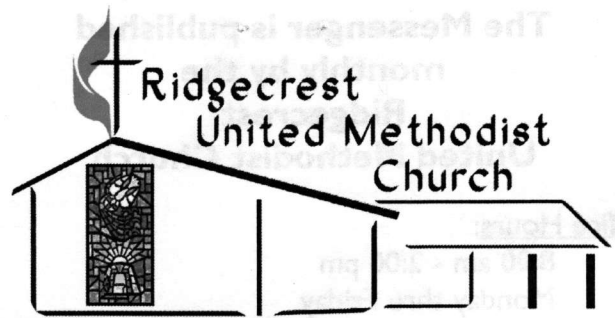

SSP SOAP SHOP REPORT

This was the 5th year we have sold artisan soap to support our fine team of High School mission ambassadors who will be participating in the Sierra Service Project in South Los Angeles this summer. It was the most successful fund raiser to date, raising \$3,984.50.

You generously bought 698 bars of soap. For a bit of perspective, our first SSP Soap Sale in 2007 brought in \$955.00 and we sold 115 bars of soap.

UNITED METHODIST WOMEN

United Methodist Women is the largest denominational faith organization for women with approximately 800,000 members whose mission is fostering spiritual growth, developing leaders and advocating for justice.

United Methodist Women's History

1869: 6 Members

Today: 800,000 members

UMW inherits the vision and toil of women's missionary societies of eight denominations since 1869. Its 140-year legacy started when the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society first organized in Boston in response to a lack of women's health in India.

Women in the Methodist and Evangelical United Brethren traditions organized about the same time in history (1869-1893) when women and children were legally classified as "chattel, legally dead, non-persons." There was little service to women because of prejudice and limitations of cultural attitudes in the church and in society

In 1869, Mrs. William Butler and Mrs. Edwin Parker, wives of missionaries to India, were home on furlough. They spoke to a group of women in Boston. Only six women were present because of an intense storm. Mrs. Butler told about the desperate spiritual and physical needs of women in India. A male doctor could not treat women. Schooling for girls was almost non-existent. Single, trained and dedicated women were needed for medical and educational work.

The six women who were present called another meeting of women, wrote a constitution, and organized the Methodist Woman's Foreign Missionary Society (WFMS). By November 1869, the newly formed organization raised funds and sent Isabella Thoburn, an educator, and Dr. Clara Swain, a doctor, to India. Ms. Thoburn began a school with six young girls in Lucknow. This school expanded to include Isabella Thoburn College, the first women's college in Asia. Dr. Swain began her medical work, resulting in the establishment of the first women's hospital in Asia. Both of these institutions are still serving the people of India.

In 1875, Lizzie Hoffman was instrumental in forming the Woman's Missionary Association of the United Brethren Church. After spending one night praying, she was convinced that the women of the church should be organized for special mission work. Sierra Leone, in Africa, was the first country to which missionaries were sent. Strong Woman's Home Missionary Societies were founded in 1880 (Methodist Episcopal Church) and 1890 (Methodist Episcopal Church, South)

In 1879, the Woman's Foreign Missionary Society of the Methodist Protestant Church was founded; and in 1884, the Woman's Missionary Society was organized in the Evangelical Association. These groups became powerful, independent women's organizations, sending hundreds of missionaries all over the world and supporting many projects

The Ladies Aid Societies, which had existed for many years, were incorporated into the missionary societies in the 1940s. Through reorganization and denominational mergers, these various groups were brought together. In 1973, United Methodist Women became the women's mission organization of The United Methodist Church.

Purpose of the United Methodist Women

The organized Unit of United Methodist Women shall be a community of Women whose PURPOSE is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ; to develop a creative, supportive fellowship; and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.

Mission Studies

Each year, United Methodist Women members prepare for faithful living and action by studying mission studies. Mission studies are offered each year - a **geographical, topical, and spiritual growth** study. These studies motivate, inform, and enrich our commitment to global ministry.

Members take one of the three mission studies through the organization's Schools of Christian Mission program offered around the country. Our School of Christian Mission is in July at Biola University. If you are interested in going, please contact Laura Lei Miller very soon!

Current Mission Studies

- Geographic study: *Haiti: Challenges and Hope*
- Spiritual Growth study: *The Journey: Forgiveness, Restorative Justice and Reconciliation*
- Topical study: *Joy to the World!: Mission in the Age of Global Christianity*

Typically, our Sister's Act Circle does one or two of these studies each year. The 3M circle may or may not do one of these studies. You do not have to be in a circle to do the studies. Also, if you are interested in starting your own study group or doing your own circle (circles do not have to be study groups, but may be fellowship groups or even craft groups or exercise groups), we would like to encourage you to do so.

Report from Haiti

United Methodist Women is exploring ways to partner with Haiti's Methodist women to expand their ability to respond to the needs of women, children and youth and increase opportunities for them to network with Methodist women in the Caribbean and the world.

These are the primary reasons I traveled with Serna Samuel, United Methodist Women regional missionary and Dorothy Goldsmith, president of the Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas Women (MCCAW), to the Methodist Guest House in Port-au-Petionville in Haiti, Mar. 14-19. We met with Women's League of Haiti, which is a district of the MCCAW, to talk about building relationships and to look at possibilities for the three organizations to work together to strengthen the Haitian women's organization.

In many ways, women in the Methodist Church in Haiti feel isolated — and they are. Haiti is a hard place. There are so many basic things that need to be done that require a functional government. For example, while driving through the country to visit United Methodist Women-supported mission projects, we saw so many poorly constructed houses, shacks really, built in the mountainside. In Haiti, people often use trees for firewood for cooking, leaving much of the mountainside barren. With no trees to hold the land in place, mountainside homes can be easily swept away in mudslides when major rain storms and floods occur — which has happened on more than one occasion. However, when I asked our guides about zoning laws to prevent such tragedies, they said zoning laws were not enforced. Government is the agency that creates and enforces such regulations, and the current government in Haiti just doesn't have the capacity to do enforcement or other basic things we expect government to do.

Mission Giving is also helping Haitian Methodist women attend the World Federation of Methodist and Uniting Church Women Assembly in Johannesburg, South Africa, Aug. 10-16. This is an opportunity for them to connect with and learn from other Methodist women around the world, many of whom are in mission in countries that until very recently were impoverished and unindustrialized but are now in various stages of development. It will be the first time in awhile Haitian women will be able to meet with sisters in other countries. The August 2010 Methodist Church in the Caribbean and the Americas Women's Assembly in the Bahamas should have been very easy for them to attend, but the Haitian women couldn't get travel visas. Haiti is so economically depressed that neighboring countries feared the women would not return home after the event but rather use the opportunity to immigrate.

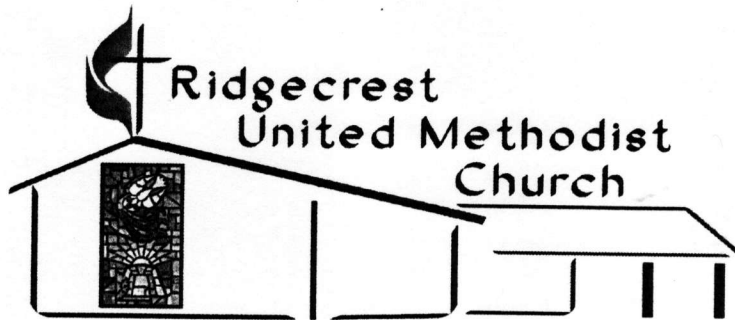
